PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

First of all, we want to thank all of those who worked so hard to stage our annual Flower and Vegetable Show at the Riviera on August 20th. This involved a huge amount of work for all of those involved. The interest and enjoyment of the Riviera residents made it all seem worthwhile. The highlight of the Show for many of us was having Wendy Roberts join us. It is so good to see her out and about again.

The heavy dew on the grass this morning gives us notice that fall is just around the corner. It is time for harvest, filling the freezer and 'putting up' batches of family favourites such as pickles, chili sauce, jams and jellies. I hope I don't get carried away again. We eat so little of that now, but it is so tempting when visiting the farmer's markets and seeing the great assortment of fruit and vegetables. I think there may be a bit of squirrel in me! Fortunately, this year there is no late blight on the tomatoes. I planted a variety called 'Legend' said to be blight resistant and so far this appears to be true.

The Van Noort bulbs will be at the September meeting for pick up for those who have pre-ordered. Please call me at 905-768-0467 if you are unable to be there to claim your order. There will be additional bulbs there for purchase including tulips, daffodil/narcissi, hyacinth, lilies, iris, crocus, garlic and foxtail lilies. Most bulbs can be safely planted right up until the ground freezes solid, often into December. However, daffodil and narcissi which bloom first are best planted earlier.

Now about the iris we have been talking about. Check the leaves carefully for any sign of iris borer or other disease. This often appears as round brown spots on the leaves. Remove these leaves and don't compost them. Before the snow comes, I like to trim all of the leaves right down to a few inches. Iris growers tend to cut these into a pointed fan shape. Not exactly sure why, but they look nice that way and it makes spring clean up much easier.

OHA CONVENTION DELEGATE

NANCY SPELLEN REPORTS:

As I sat listening to the speakers talk about re-greening of Sudbury, I thought the residents should be very proud of themselves, as I was of them. I got caught up in the emotion and passion that Sudburinites have for their efforts. There wasn't a dry eye in the house.

The speaker for Saturday night at the banquet was Franco Mariotti. 'Hope in a changing world' was the topic. He was born in Sudbury and as a boy knew Sudbury only as a rock. There were no trees. No trees - can you imagine that! When I told people I was going to Sudbury they would ask 'Sudbury - why?' Apparently that is the thinking of a lot of people including me. I really didn't know what had happened or why.

The mining industry was the direct result of what changed the landscape of Sudbury and surrounding areas. They cut down trees to burn in the smelters. The roast yards were the size of 5 football fields burning 24 hours a day in the 60's and 70's. They burned the ore to make the metal. Burning this ore produced sulphur dioxide as the bi-product which fell on the soil and change the soil to be too acidic to grow anything. They then had a different way to burn the ore and had a great big tall smoke stack to shoot the sulphur dioxide higher in the air. 80,000 hectares were destroyed. The watershed was greatly affected. The lake's ph was like vinegar and all the vegetation and fish were gone.

Something had to be done.

In the early 80's Sudbury decided to change this situation. They had to fix the soil and the water. If you fix the soil and land, then this will fix the water. Limestone was brought in from Manitoulin Island by the bag full. The limestone would neutralize the ph in the soil. It was like fertilizer for the soil. They could then plant grasses and legume seeds. It would be 7 years before they could plant any trees. This was a massive effort by every group and organization in and around Sudbury. Each bag of limestone had to be opened and spread evenly over the land. WOW what an undertaking!

When we were in Barrie last year for the OHA Convention, Sudbury was promoting its hosting of the convention this year. They showed pictures of what it was reduced to and then proudly showed pictures after so many years of diligent work that had obviously been done. I thought to myself - I gotta see this! What an education. I was so glad I was able to go. Today Sudbury looks like any other northern town in Ontario. The lakes are beautiful, and kids were having a blast swimming and people are fishing again!

Next year's Convention is in Niagara on the Lake: so much closer to home. I recommend that you consider attending. There is always something new to learn.
