PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Let's hope we have a long warm Fall. A large portion of my transplants are still not in the ground. Just when my good old clay is just about ready to rototill, it rains one more time. But it doesn't stop the weeds from growing. The warm weather has brought on the first flush of crab grass as well as many of the perennial grasses. The worst of these is nut grass, also known as yellow sedge. It is said to be among the five worst invasive weeds. What makes this grass such a threat is that it is near impossible to eradicate, especially now that we are unable to use herbicides. Nut grass looks innocent enough, almost attractive even. It sends up a triangular seed stalk in mid summer and of course spreads the seed to mature next year. But it has an additional method of reproduction. At the end of its long root it carries a small solid nut about the size of a pea. When you pull out the nut grass, the nut stays behind and ensures that the grass will be back next season. We will have some samples of this grass at the next meeting. This is one weed that you want to be on the lookout for.

For those who missed the May meeting, we have some good news to share. Catherine McGill, who has been training as a horticulture judge has successfully completed the programme and received her certificate in May at the graduation ceremony of the 5th School of Horticultural Judging, held at RBG. Catherine looked 'Royal' in a feathery fascinator.

Our plant sale was a great success. How could it fail when we have such supportive members!! Members who came straight from work on Friday night to help set up; members who were unable to come but called to say they had potted plants to be picked up; and those who brought in baking Saturday morning still warm from the oven. And of course, a huge thank-you to Nancy Spellen, who masterminded the whole thing.

Mark your calendar for Gord's bus trip which takes the place of the July meeting. It is usually considered the highlight of our year.
